READ THE BIBLE IN TWO YEARS:

Something you might like to use to extend your daily Bible reading.

The Bible is truly an extraordinary book, unique among all other books. It consists of 66 individual books, written by 40 different authors, in three different languages across 1,500 years of history. Yet for all of this diversity it contains a unified message that focuses on the coming of Jesus and the amazing salvation He offers through His death and resurrection!

The Bible contains words written by men in all the richness of literary types making it fun, challenging and enjoyable to dig into. Yet, at the same time, the Bible is also the very words of God given to us by His Spirit (1 Peter 1:21; 2 Timothy 3:16-17). These are not just words spoken in times past, but words that are alive for us to read today (Hebrews 4:12-13). The God of the universe actually addresses us today clearly in the pages of the Bible – amazing!

Jesus says the entire Bible points us to Him, that He is the focal point of it all. Listen to what He says, "He said to them, "This is what I told you while I was still with you: Everything must be fulfilled that is written about me in the Law of Moses, the Prophets and the Psalms." (Luke 24:44). Or, again Jesus says, "You study the Scriptures diligently because you think that in them you have eternal life. These are the very Scriptures that testify about me, yet you refuse to come to me to have life." (John 5:39-40).

Knowing this is helpful in motivating us to read the Bible regularly, to keep building a bigger understanding of God's purposes and how they are being fulfilled in Jesus. To help with this, the Daily Reading Notes now include an extra challenge: to read the whole Bible in two years. It's totally optional, are you up for it?

There is a list of around 15 chapters of additional reading for each week of the term that will help you achieve this challenge. These readings can be done on whatever days work best and in whatever order you prefer to read them. At the end of each term you have a chance to catch up before the next term's suggested readings begin again. You can also track your readings across the two years right here. Enjoy!

INTRODUCTION: JOHN 1-4

John is the last of the four gospels to be written. Although the book itself does not say who wrote it, external evidence tells us it was written by John, the son of Zebedee within the last two decades of the first century.


John is unique among the four gospels in its structure, content and style. Most commentators identify four major sections in John's gospel: a prologue (1:1-18), an epilogue (21:1-25), and two major central sections: the book of signs (1:19-12:50) and the book of glory (13:1-20:31). John calls the miracles of Jesus 'signs' that point to the identity of the one performing them. Up to chapter 13 there are seven major signs recorded. These signs are chosen deliberately as pointers to the identity of Jesus.

The gospels of Matthew, Mark and Luke are known as the Synoptic Gospels because they share a similar structure and content to each other. Much of the content of the Synoptic Gospels is not found in John. There are no narrative parables, account of the transfiguration, record of the institution of the Lord's supper, casting out of demons, or account of Jesus' baptism. John records very little of Jesus' ministry in the north, in Galilee, but focuses on the south, particularly around Jerusalem.

John's style is also very different. He makes more of the spiritual significance or symbolism surrounding events, such as the symbolism of light and dark as seen in events involving Nicodemus and Judas (3:19, 20; 13:30). While the other gospels record the miracles of Jesus and only occasionally make their significance explicit, John reviews the facts in light of their interpretation.

Despite these differences, John has the same aim as the other gospels. He did not write to give us lessons for life but to help us understand that Jesus is the Christ who came in fulfilment of Old Testament expectations that we might have life in his name (1:12,13; 20:30, 31).

Prayerfully reflecting on John's gospel will deepen your faith and enable you to appreciate more fully the implications of the truth about Jesus so you experience in fuller measure the life of the kingdom now and the certainty of its fullness in the age to come.

Greeks saw the 'word' or 'logos' as the organising principle of the universe; it was the logos that gave order to everything. Both Jews and Greeks would have been shocked to think that the 'logos' became flesh.

WEEK 6: JOHN 2:1-22

DAY 1

Read John 2:1-11

Running out of wine at a gathering like this constituted a major social embarrassment – there is even the possibility that the groom could have been sued.

Jesus' address of his mother is simply the word "woman". This sounds a little harsher to our ears than it was, in fact though it is certainly a formal and 'distancing' way for a son to address his mother, notice also that Mary is not named throughout the story. There is no attempt to draw attention to her and she is in no way the 'master' of her son as some varieties of theology would suggest.




