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READ THE BIBLE IN TWO YEARS

Something you might like to use to extend your daily Bible reading.

The Bible is truly an extraordinary book, unique among all other books. It consists of 66 individual books, written by 40 different authors, in three different languages across 1,500 years of history. Yet for all of this diversity it contains a unified message that focuses on the coming of Jesus and the amazing salvation He offers through His death and resurrection!

The Bible contains words written by men in all the richness of literary types making it fun, challenging and enjoyable to dig into. Yet, at the same time, the Bible is also the very words of God given to us by His Spirit (1 Peter 1:21; 2 Timothy 3:16-17). These are not just words spoken in times past, but words that are alive for us to read today (Hebrews 4:12-13). The God of the universe actually addresses us today clearly in the pages of the Bible – amazing!

Jesus says the entire Bible points us to Him, that He is the focal point of it all. Listen to what He says, "He said to them, "This is what I told you while I was still with you: Everything must be fulfilled that is written about me in the Law of Moses, the Prophets and the Psalms." (Luke 24:44). Or, again Jesus says, "You study the Scriptures diligently because you think that in them you have eternal life. These are the very Scriptures that testify about me, yet you refuse to come to me to have life." (John 5:39-40).

Knowing this is helpful in motivating us to read the Bible regularly, to keep building a bigger understanding of God's purposes and how they are being fulfilled in Jesus. To help with this, the Daily Reading Notes now include an extra challenge: to read the whole Bible in two years. It's totally optional, are you up for it?

There is a list of around 15 chapters of additional reading for each week of the term that will help you achieve this challenge. These readings can be done on whatever days work best and in whatever order you prefer to read them. At the end of each term you have a chance to catch up before the next term's suggested readings begin again. You can also track your readings across the two years right here. Enjoy!

INTRODUCTION: 2 CORINTHIANS

The city of Corinth

At the bottom of an impressive rugged limestone summit, Greek Corinth had existed for several hundred years before it was destroyed by Rome in 146 BC. The city was rebuilt by Julius Caesar in 44 BC, becoming one of the most important cities of the Roman Empire. Corinth was the capital of the province of Achaia and the seat of the governor.

Roman Corinth was rich, trendy, and religiously diverse, accustomed to visits by impressive travelling public speakers, and obsessed with status, self-promotion, and personal rights. From a Jewish or Christian perspective, as with any pagan city, its inhabitants were marked by the worship of idols, sexual immorality, and greed.

Paul's relationship with the Corinthians

The church in Corinth began in approximately AD 50-51 as part of Paul's second missionary journey; his relationship with them was roughly over a seven-year period. Paul visited Corinth three times and wrote four letters in total, two of which have been lost to time. The letters we know as 1 and 2 Corinthians are actually his second and fourth letters to them.

Paul's purpose in writing 2 Corinthians

In between 1 and 2 Corinthians, Paul had written the church a "severe letter" to encourage them to repent of something (7:6-16). Titus had previously returned from Corinth with news of the Corinthians' positive response and repentance, greatly encouraging Paul. So Paul wrote this letter to share his joy over their repentance with them (7:4 and 16), to encourage the Corinthians' ongoing obedience (8:10-11) and to prepare the Corinthians for Paul's upcoming visit (12:14). Overall, the letter was written to "strengthen" the faith of the Corinthian church (12:19).

"Ordinary"

We've called this series "Ordinary" because Paul's key encouragement to the Corinthians is to realise that God uses very ordinary things in extraordinary ways. Things that look amazing are "seen", and "temporary" and "fading away". But the most important things are "unseen", "eternal" and "glorious".

The whole Christian life is lived trusting an invisible God, "we live by faith, not by sight" (5:7). Just as the Corinthians lived in a world dominated by what they could see, we too are constantly pulled to love and trust the visible. Just as God used this letter to strengthen the Corinthians thousands of years ago, He'll do the same for us today.

Paul's commitment to Gospel ministry was unique. But it wasn't simply that he was a unique man — he still considered himself weak, a jar of clay. Rather, Paul's clarity about his future was key to his perseverance through trouble and suffering for the sake of Christ.

Some of these motivators can seem to be in conflict with each other, but when you understand God as Paul does, they fit. As we understand God and His plans more clearly, the motivation for the Christian life flows more naturally.

DAY 1: What is in the heart

2. What does Paul say here about his motivations for being accepted by the Corinthians?

3. What could you do today to help you focus on what's in the heart, rather than what's seen?

Prayer: Thank God that He tells us about what really matters: not external appearances, but eternal, spiritual, unseen reality. Ask for help in discerning what truly matters as you seek to please Him today.
